Proper nouns

Chiang Mai, Thailand, Kermit, Amazon and Everest

Concrete nouns

a physical thing, e.g. dog, ball, cliff

Abstract nouns

not a physical thing,

e.g. freedom, happiness, sadness - can you see or touch sadness?

singular noun

talks about only one thing like saying "one cat" or "a book"

plural noun

talks about more than one thing like saying "many cats" or "some books"

plural nouns

Nouns change when there are more than one

Wrong: I have two dog

Correct: I have two dogs

regular nouns

- one flower, two flowers
- one week, two weeks
- one place, two places
- one pot, two pots

irregular nouns

Single: leaf, child, fungus,

mouse, sheep

Plural: leaves, children,

fungi, mice, sheep

countable nouns

we have looked at plural nouns (student => students)

but

some nouns are not 'countable' (1 student, 2 students, ...,)

so nouns are countable nouns or uncountable nouns

For example: "apple" "rice" "bread"

two apples two rice two bread two apples a bowl of rice two slices of bread I bought two apples.

I need some rice for the recipe.

Can you buy a loaf of bread?

countable and uncountable nouns

Countable Nouns:

- I bought three bananas.
- He has two pizzas for the party.
- The children ate five cookies after school.
- We picked six oranges from the tree.
- There are eight tomatoes in the basket.

countable and uncountable nouns

Uncountable Nouns:

- I need some flour for baking.
- She enjoys drinking tea in the morning.
- Can you pass me a little salt, please?
- We bought a bottle of water at the store.
- The recipe calls for a cup of sugar.
- He prefers coffee with a splash of milk.

countable and uncountable nouns?

- My friend gave me four chocolates.
- Some words can be used with different meanings

uncountable

- chocolate bar
 - e.g. I ate 2 pieces of chocolate

countable


- box of chocolates
 - e.g. I took 3 chocolates
