Sentences in English have a S-V-O structure

subject verb object

John played with the ball

He was sleeping in the bed

A woman is watching TV

Subject - is doing something (the verb)

Object - (verb) is doing to this



Sentence SVO



modifier = modifies the noun modifies = changes or 'adds to'

noun phrases

- A noun phrase consists of a noun and its modifiers.
- Modifiers include articles, adjectives, and other elements that provide more information about the noun.
 - The happy cat
 - Two delicious slices of pizza

verb phrases

- A verb phrase includes the main verb and its auxiliary (helping) verbs, if any. It represents the action or state of being in a sentence.
 - Is studying for the exam
 - Will have completed the project

verb phrases later in the course

prepositional phrases

- A prepositional phrase begins with a preposition and includes a noun (or pronoun) called the object of the preposition.
- It provides information about the relationship of the noun to the rest of the sentence.
 - on the table
 - under the bridge

prepositional phrases seen already

Noun Phrases

what is a noun phrase?

A noun phrase is a group of words related to a noun The big red ball rolled down the hill

noun phrases can include:

articles (the) - adjectives (big, red) - nouns (ball)

but do not include the verb

The big red ball rolled down the hill

noun phrases

These are the noun phrases

- Article + noun (the boy, the ball, a boy, a ball, an artist, an apple)
- Adjective + noun (small boy, new ball)
- Article + adjective + noun (the small boy, a new ball)
- Article + adjective + adjective + noun
 - the small Indian boy
 - a big, new ball

A blue pen could be any pen that is blue

The blue pen is a specific pen

definite article the

indefinite articles a

an

Articles - what we know

articles are:

- a type of determiner
- they modify nouns
- a, an, the

examples:

- the blue pen
- John is <u>a</u> good friend
- the big park was fun

adjectives in noun phrases

adjectives:

- describe
- add more information to a word

examples:

- the <u>blue</u> pen
- John is my <u>best</u> friend
- The big park was fun


What is an Adjective

The Adjective is one of the parts of speech that describes some extra information about the noun or a pronoun in a sentence.

Structure: Article + Adjective + Noun

Example: The *happy* children played.
