what is a collocation?

a correct use of words together

- e.g. 'heavy rain' but not strong rain
- e.g. 'do exercise' but not make exercise

What is a collocation?

A collocation is a combination of two or more words that are commonly used together, in a way that sounds natural to a native English speaker


e.g. heavy rain, brand new, catch fire

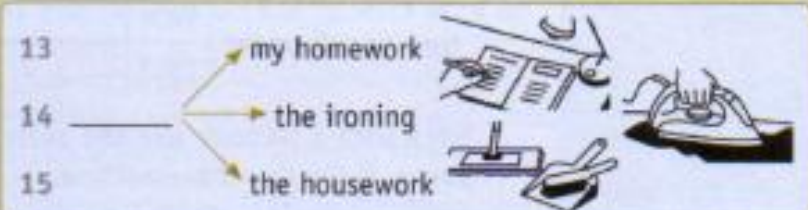
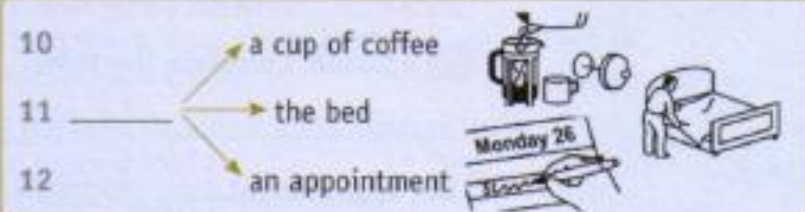
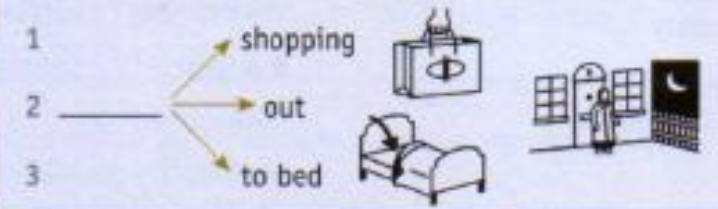

- cycling, horse riding, ice skating, skiing, snowboarding...



do - with individual sports not ending in -ing, combat sports (even when ending in -ing)

- gymnastics, athletics, karate, judo, aerobics, yoga...
- boxing, wrestling...

Examples: collocations with SPEAK

I could hardly speak.	adverb + verb
Why did you refuse to speak ?	verb + verb
Are they on speaking terms with each other?	phrase
They spoke briefly on Skype.	verb + adverb
I need to speak to you.	verb + preposition

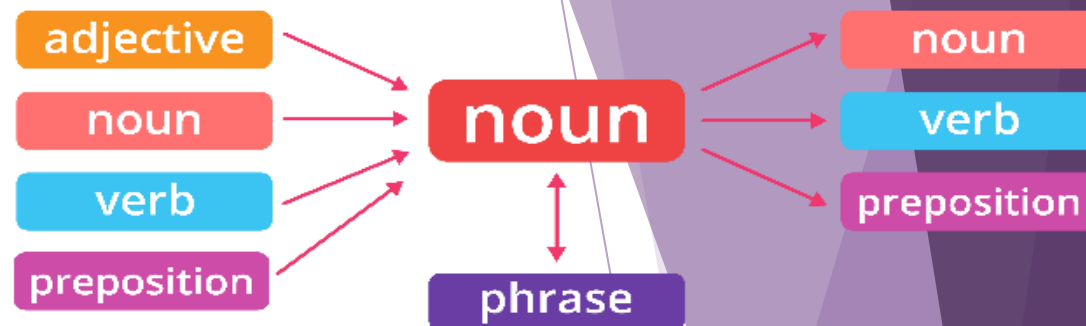
Examples: collocations with DEVELOP

The situation is developing very fast.	noun + verb
You should develop your drawing skills .	verb + noun

Examples: collocations with DECIDE

We decided to try again.	verb + verb
I was allowed to decide for myself.	phrase

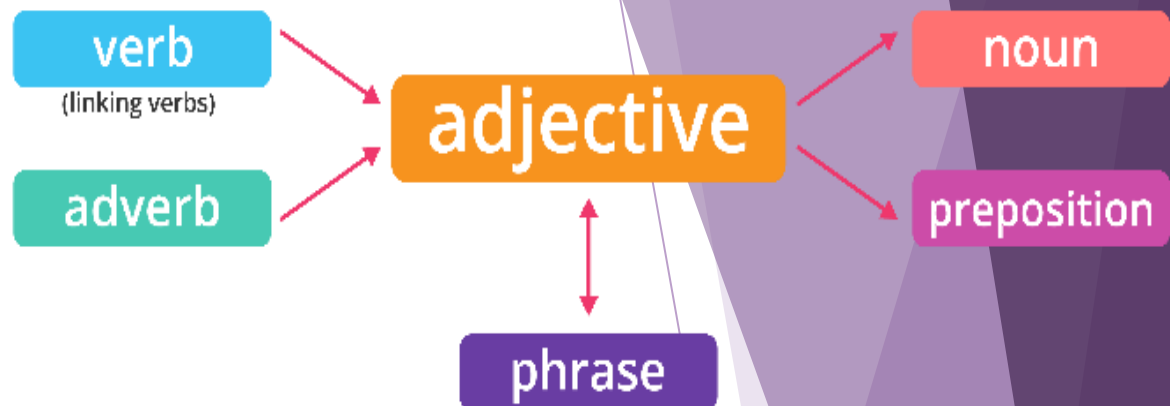
Examples: collocations with SITUATION

It was an awkward situation.	adjective + noun
I love modern situation comedies.	noun + noun
I try to avoid such situations .	verb + noun
Why did this situation arise ?	noun + verb
What to do in this situation ?	preposition + noun
You don't understand the seriousness of the situation .	phrase

Examples: collocations with TICKET

I'm going to buy a plane ticket toay.	noun + noun
Where is the ticket to the concert?	noun + preposition

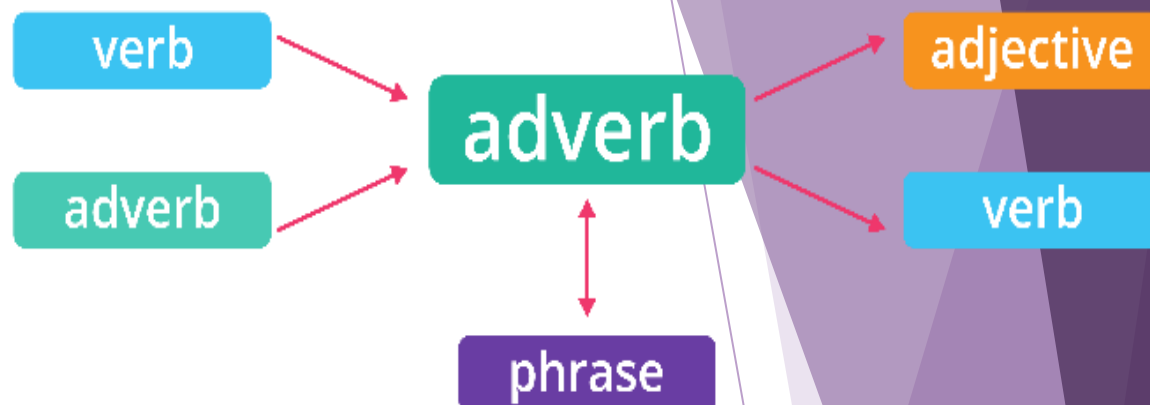

The flower smells nice .	linking verb + adjective
She is an incredibly nice girl.	adverb + adjective
It was a nice idea .	adjective + noun
She is very nice to me.	adjective + preposition
They have a nice little garden.	phrase

She did it very quickly .	adverb + adverb

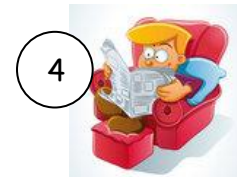
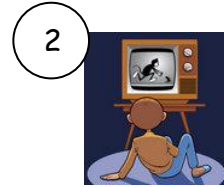
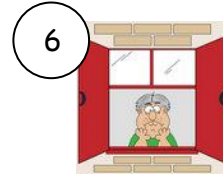
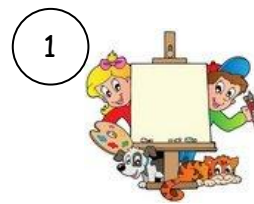

- **Have a conversation:** To talk with someone in a friendly and informal way.
- **Take a look:** To look at something or someone briefly.
- **Have a meeting:** To gather with others to discuss or work on a particular topic.
- **Have a good time:** To enjoy oneself; to experience a pleasant or enjoyable period.
- **Take a seat:** To sit down.
- **Have a dream:** To experience a series of images, ideas, and emotions during sleep.
- **Have a feeling:** To be aware of or experience an emotion or sensation.
